

## WRIGHT STATE UNIVERSITY LIBRARIES Collection Development Policy Statement

**SUBJECT:** Psychiatry

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### UNIVERSITY PROGRAMS

The Department of Psychiatry is part of the WSU School of Medicine and offers a four year residency in general psychiatry and a two year residency in Child Psychiatry which is additional training completed after a four year residency. The mission of the department of Psychiatry is to teach and study mental health, mental illness, and treatment. The Psychiatry Department accomplishes this mission by preparing residents to be psychiatrists, performing clinically based research, teaching medical students about psychiatry, attracting graduate medical residents, fostering affiliations with the larger community, and promoting interdisciplinary and inter-facility collaboration. Since 1977, the Wright State University Integrated Psychiatry Residency Training Program has been dedicated to preparing the practitioners of psychiatric medicine to deal comfortably and effectively with emotional and behavioral issues through personal intervention.

The program is eclectic in philosophy, regarding expertise in biological, behavioral, social and psychodynamic perspectives as necessary capacities for the practice of contemporary psychiatry. Training equips the resident with the ability to treat patients of different ages, cultures and gender with a broad range of modalities. The program maintains a consistent focus on the role of the psychiatrist in the community. Consultation and liaison skills, and the ability to interact with other health professionals, are necessary elements of this focus. The roles of the psychiatrist in the medical profession and in society are always emphasized.

Major teaching and research interests of current faculty include: forensic psychiatry, Integration of psychotherapies, biologic dimensions of psychotherapy, community organization of psychiatric services, geriatric psychiatry, psychodynamic and cognitive psychotherapies, autistic and other developmental disorders, child psychiatry education, communication disorders, health care delivery systems, rural psychiatry, mental retardation and developmental disabilities, neuropsychology, cultural issues in psychiatry, psychiatric evaluation, Individual psychotherapy, family therapy, pharmacotherapy, independent medical evaluations (IMEs), violence prediction, ethics, medical decision-making, drug treatment of psychotic disorders, stalking, psychoanalysis, eating disorders, borderline personality disorder, consultations to primary care medicine, neuroimaging, innovative treatment for psychotic disorders, and women's issues.

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### **SCOPE OF COLLECTION**

#### **Dates covered: intellectual content**

The emphasis of the collection is on recent developments in the field. Materials on the history of psychiatry are collected selectively.

#### **Dates covered: publication dates**

Most of the items collected are current imprints. Retrospective purchases (e.g., backfiles of a journal) may be made on occasion.

#### **Geographic coverage**

No restrictions.

#### **Language**

Materials are collected in English, including translations into English. Other languages may be included in the case of joint language publications where one of the languages is English.

#### **Types of materials**

Monographic titles and serials are collected. Subscriptions to databases include those with citations to articles and books and those with full text. A list of databases relevant to psychiatry is available at

#### **Format**

Materials collected are in print and electric format. Relevant videotapes and DVDs are also collected. Selected websites are included in the online catalog.

#### **Exclusions**

Workbooks are generally not collected.

### **LOCATION OF MATERIALS**

The Fordham Health Sciences Library is the major location for the psychiatry collection. The Dunbar Library holds materials in psychology that are relevant to psychiatry (e.g., clinical psychology, abnormal psychology). Older and/or seldom used materials are located in the Southwest Ohio Regional Depository.

## **INTERDISCIPLINARY RELATIONSHIPS**

Selection of materials in psychiatry may overlap with the areas of professional psychology, psychology, neurology, family practice, pediatrics, and pharmacology.

## **LOCAL AND REGIONAL RESOURCES**

### **Local and regional collections**

Several OhioLINK Libraries have strong collections in psychology and psychiatry. The Libraries at Ohio State University and the University of Cincinnati support residency programs in Psychiatry and Ph.D. programs in experimental and clinical psychology.

### **Cooperative loan arrangements**

OhioLINK provides access to circulating materials collected by most academic libraries in Ohio. OhioLINK membership also provides Wright State with membership in the Center for Research Libraries, which enables faculty, staff, and students to obtain Center materials through interlibrary loan.
